We need to make sure that people with disabilities are considered in these goals. Sometimes it seems like DEI efforts don't consider this. As far as the balanced mobility goal, in addition to being safe, reliable, and affordable, they should also be comfortable (and, ideally, beautiful) for people who are walking, biking, or taking the bus which means, I think, better bus shelters, more seating for rests on walks, more street shade trees, greater distance between the sidewalk and the road, and public restroom availability.	
While I agree with the Balanced Mobility Goal, I do have a comment on it. Do we really want driving single-occupancy vehicles to be "affordable"? As long as they're affordable and convenient, that is the way most people will choose to get around. We should be prioritizing methods of mobility that are better for the health of people and environment, leaving open the possibility of raising the cost of parking, charging for parking in more places, and having tolls or congestion pricing. Writing "affordable" for all methods of transportation into the Master Plan could make it harder to do what needs to be done to nudge people to find safer, more sustainable ways to get around, that make GR a more pleasant place to live as the population grows.	
	A project similar to Holland's energy park could go a long way in helping keep utility costs low for residents, creating pride in the area, and keeping money in the local economy.
